

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Letter to the editor

We were very pleased to read the article in the January 2008 edition of Brain Injury on the use of PDA's as cognitive aids for individuals following traumatic brain injury. This is an intervention that we use regularly here at the Oliver Zangwill Centre in Ely, UK; therefore it is highly beneficial to have research evidence to support this. However, we would like to highlight that the NeuroPage service mentioned in the paper, which we run, remains fully functional throughout the UK, therefore the statement that it is 'no longer available commercially' (p. 20) as written in this paper is incorrect. The NeuroPageTM service continues to be a successful clinical activity of the Centre. It is a cognitive prosthesis service that provides prompts and alerts for people with memory and planning difficulties for NHS and private clients throughout the UK (www.neuropage.nhs.uk). We are currently undertaking further work to enable clinicians to set up similar services in other countries. We would be most grateful if you would be able to notify your readers and the authors of this error. The most

recent paper illustrating use of *NeuroPage* was published in JINS [1], also in January.
